## **President's Message**

I'd like to invite you to experience the new CBCA website, created by WWU web developer Ryan Bahm and web designer Indra Pernell. Check it out at <a href="https://www.chuckanutcommunity.org">www.chuckanutcommunity.org</a>. The public can access the home page and the newsletter, including an archive of past newsletters.

But once you have created your own username and password, you'll have access to the password-protected directory, bulletins posted by your Board (events and announcements), plus a separate user bulletin page, on which you can post your own bulletins regarding community matters – lost pets, neighborhood crime, etc.

In order to create your username and password, you'll need (one time only) a unique registration number, which you can request by emailing <a href="mailto:admin@chuckanutcommunity.org">admin@chuckanutcommunity.org</a>, and then enter by clicking on register in the upper-right corner of the Welcome page.

After creating your username and password, you will be able to edit your household information – update who lives there, phone numbers and email addresses (selecting which, if any, you want to appear in the directory), household resources (CPR? Chainsaw? Rescue boat? Medical skills?) and household special needs (anyone who might need special attention in an emergency, etc.) The depth of information you choose to share will be completely up to your discretion.

There are also pod functions, indicating your household pod and Pod Captain, allow the captains to communicate with neighborhood pod members, etc.

It's a good start, and your questions and comments are encouraged. Just email the Admin, as above.

FYI, there can be only one username and password per household, rather than per individual, so all the residents of your house will share a single username/password.

On another subject, I'd like to thank Vice-President Chris Donaldson for lining up newlyelected County Executive Jack Louws to speak at our April general meeting. Join us Wednesday, April 4<sup>th</sup>, 7:30 PM at the Chuckanut Fire Hall for a meet-and-greet, Q&A, and all that good stuff.

# A History of Service: The Chuckanut Fire Department



For residents of the Chuckanut area, fire protection presents special challenges. Homes may be isolated, many roads are steep and narrow, and water for firefighting can be hard to come by. In the mid-1950's, after several fires, residents petitioned the county to form Whatcom County Fire District 6. During its first year of existence, the new fire district raised \$600 in funds and contracted with the Bellingham Fire Department for firefighting services. However, the lack of fire hydrants in the Chuckanut area made it difficult for city engines to extinguish fires there, and in at least one case the firefighters resorted to using garden hoses.

The District 6 Board of Fire Commissioners considered other options for providing services, such as installing fire hydrants. However, at a cost of \$375 apiece the commissioners deemed this option too expensive. In the early 1960's, a fire extinguisher company was contacted about the possibility of providing chemical tank carts throughout the district. This also turned out to cost too much. In the end, fire extinguishers were provided to homeowners at a discounted price with the hope a small fire could be put out before the entire house was affected.

In 1966, the fire commissioners determined more funding was needed to augment the district's reserves of \$3,000. The commissioners decided to ask the voters to approve a \$16,000 bond, and agreed to disband the fire district if the funding was not secured. Fortunately, district voters overwhelmingly approved the bond measure.

Several months after the bond was passed, an elderly resident died in a house fire. Shortly thereafter, the fire commissioners approved \$1200 for the purchase of land to build a fire station. A concrete block structure was built to house the district's first fire engine: a 1956 American LaFrance pumper with a 500-gallon water tank, acquired from the city of Seaside, Oregon. During this same period, the Ladies' Fire Auxiliary was formed to provide extra funding for the district by organizing rummage sales and bake sales.


During the following years, the district obtained more used equipment, including a water tanker and support vehicles, and volunteers were trained in firefighting. In the early 1970's, the fire station was expanded to include a meeting room and kitchen. Also during this decade, the fire district volunteers were trained in basic first aid, and began responding to medical calls.

# History (continued)

In 1988, the fire district purchased its first new vehicle, a Ford one-ton mini-pumper. In 1990, the original American LaFrance was replaced with a 1969 Crown Fire Coach, which was well suited to climbing the Chuckanut hills. The Chuckanut Firefighters and Community Association (CCFA) was formed, and volunteer firefighters were recruited from Fairhaven and Western Washington University. In 1994, a \$495,000 bond issue was passed by district residents. In 1996, the fire station was remodeled and expanded to its current size, and a 1996 Freightliner fire engine was purchased to take some of the firefighting load off the 1969 crown fire coach.

Although Fire District 6 continued to grow through the 1990's, it was becoming apparent that development in the Chuckanut area was making it difficult for the volunteer department to provide adequate levels of service to its residents. Fire District 6 had had a long relationship with the Lake Samish, Yew Street Road, and Geneva/Sudden Valley fire districts, and in 2009 the four districts came together to form the South Whatcom Regional Fire Authority. Training and emergency response is greatly enhanced in the Chuckanut region through this affiliation.

# Free and low cost classes for South Whatcom Fire Authority Residents

<u>CPR:</u> Thursday, March 29<sup>th</sup> 6:30 - 9:00 pm at the Geneva Fire Station, 4518 Cable St. This single class covers adult/child CPR, use of AED (automated external defibrillator), and foreign body airway obstruction (choking) relief. Cards are issued upon request.

<u>General First Aid:</u> Monday April 23<sup>rd</sup>, 6:30-9:30pm at the Geneva Fire Station, 4518 Cable St. This single class covers common medical emergencies. Cards are issued upon request.

<u>CERT:</u> Seven Wednesdays beginning April 11<sup>th, 6:00</sup>-9:00p at the Sudden Valley Fire Station. Community Emergence Response Team (CERT) This is a national curriculum and is offered by the Whatcom County Division of Emergency Management. Participants learn what to do, after a major disaster, to care for their families and community. Topics include disaster preparation, fire suppression, disaster first aid, search and rescue and disaster psychology. Cost is \$50.00 and includes personal protective equipment.
